## Governor Signs Bill to Authorize Community Colleges to Assist Katrina Evacuees

**SACRAMENTO, CA** - Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger signed AB 1646 (Liu), a measure that, among other actions, authorizes California Community College (CCC) districts to exempt college students, who were displaced as a result of Hurricane Katrina, from nonresident tuition. This bill has an urgency clause which means its provisions will be implemented immediately. The fee exemption enacted by AB 1646 only applies to the 2005-06 academic year. Speaking on behalf of California's Community Colleges', Chancellor Marshall (Mark) Drummond expressed his gratitude to the Governor and Assembly Member Carol Liu (D-La Canada Flintridge). "This bill will allow our colleges to extend a helping hand to displaced students immediately. Both the Governor and Assembly Member Liu must be commended for their courage in seizing the initiative to provide some margin of relief to the students and citizens of Alabama, Louisiana or Mississippi," he said. Specifically AB 1646:

*1) Authorizes CCC districts to exempt students from nonresident tuition, who as of August 29, 2005, were enrolled or were admitted and intended to enroll, in the fall term of 2005-2006 in a higher education institution in Alabama, Louisiana, or Mississippi and who can no longer attend as a result of damage sustained to their institution in Hurricane Katrina.*

*2) Requires the CCC Chancellor to develop guidelines for implementation and standards for documentation of student eligibility to the extent feasible.*

*3) Authorizes displaced students who are low income to be eligible for a CCC Board of Governors fee waiver.*

*4) Provides that CCC districts are eligible to receive Full-Time Equivalent Student (FTES) apportionment for these students as long as the amount does not exceed the existing 3% growth cap for which funding has been appropriated.*

*5) Declares legislative intent that CCC use apportionment and growth funds provided in the 2005 Budget Act.*

Chancellor Drummond noted that 35 community colleges reported 86 Hurricane Katrina evacuees had enrolled in their campuses, according to figures reported to the California Community Colleges on September 23. "More Katrina displaced students may now consider continuing their education in the 2005-06 academic year once they learn their fees would be waived," Chancellor Drummond said.

Students and faculty in all of the California community colleges will continue to have free access to one of the premier online information databases covering countries of the world, *Country Watch*. The database, which is a major resource tool for businesses, consultants and researchers, contains up-to-date economic, political, and social data about every country on the globe.

The Council of Chief Librarians and the Community College League are continuing their joint commitment to full coverage of the cost. This is the fifth year that the resource has been provided to the colleges at no cost. Both organizations – partners in the cooperative purchasing program for online resources for CCC libraries – use a portion of the fees generated by the program to provide the database to every college regardless of the level of participation in the purchasing program. CCL and the League see this as an opportunity to use the program to benefit the colleges over and above the main focus of the purchasing program.

## OUR COLLEAGUES PRESENT THEIR RESEARCH

Cheryl Warren, Las Positas College's Library Coordinator, and Tina Inzerilla, a Masters candidate in School of Library and Information Science, San José State University and practicum student at LPC Library presented their published paper "Pilot Project : Redesigning Student Assignments through Collaboration of Academic Faculty and Library Faculty in a Community College Setting" at the Treasure Mountain Research Retreat in Pittsburgh, PA on October 5.

As invited speakers, they shared their work on collaborating with teaching faculty in order to promote assignments that better utilize the library resources while effectively addressing information literacy issues such as plagiarism. The project used Dr. David Loertscher's "Ban Those Bird Units", which includes 15 instructional design models for classroom assignments developed for K-12. An added feature of the pilot project was to assess the transferability of the models to an academic setting.

## THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE STRATEGIC PLAN

- Highlight the successes of the Colleges in educating 2.4 million Californians each year
- Increase the visibility and leverage of the Colleges in the state policy arena
- Address key issues of access, quality, and funding for the Community Colleges as a whole through an effective and coordinated approach
- Create a shared vision with for advancing the Community Colleges as a core element of California's educational system.
- Develop an ongoing process for strategic action

### **Google Offers Index of Public Domain Works**

Google Inc.'s Internet-leading search engine on Thursday will begin serving up the entire contents of books and government documents that aren't entangled in a copyright battle over how much material can be scanned and indexed from five major libraries.

The list of Google's so-called "public domain" works volumes no longer protected by copyright include Henry James novels, Civil War histories, Congressional acts and biographies of wealthy New Yorkers.

Google said the material, available at <http://www.print.google.com>, represents the first large batch of public domain books and documents to be indexed in its search engine since the Mountain View-based company announced an ambitious library-scanning project late last year.

The program is designed to make more library material available through a few clicks of a computer mouse and attract more people to click on the highly profitable ads that Google displays on its Web site.
